After several days, I knew I had to take it off otherwise it would never get trimmed and bound! I bound it using "Susi's



magic binding" method which involves inserting a flange to allow machine stitching in the ditch, instead of hand sewing the binding down. Yay finished and back on the bed! mmm lovely!

We welcome some new members to our committee this year – Karen Lee, Rebecca Owen and Kathy White. There have been some portfolio changes too, so bear with us as we settle into new roles.

We are working on new ideas to encourage new members and of course keep our regular members happy, if you've got some ideas let your committee know – come and have a chat on Guild day. At the committee meeting (which followed the general meeting), in accordance with the majority, who indicated by show of hands, it was agreed to drop the cost of refreshments.

The annual cost of this to the Guild is approx. \$1700. It doesn't sound much, but we need to consider the not too distant future... AGM Guidelines

At the AGM it was requested that I explain what happens or is expected at an Annual General Meeting: In the beginning ... there is a constitution, which is the governance document of the Guild.

There are strict rules laid out in the constitution on how the society is run. These can only be changed by majority vote at an AGM, and before any change can be voted on, the correct procedure must be followed. Every incorporated society, must hold an Annual General Meeting – this follows a structured agenda, in accordance with the constitution.

The AGM is the place to make changes to the constitution, and therefore all remits presented must relate to the constitution or governing rules.

These changes, or amendments, to the constitution are registered with the Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment– following the correct procedures.

Rule 6.8 (see below) is the reason at the AGM, that we could not act upon the member's request for free refreshments and why we addressed it at the monthly meeting

As I stressed at the meeting – your committee is available before each meeting for discussing anything you have on your mind. We are also all contactable by phone or email. At the end of each monthly meeting I will call for question time, another method to conduct a healthy debate.



Community Quilts

Yes, winter is here again with plenty of wet weather so far.

I could never get over how trees & plants here grow faster and bigger than Japan. NZ pine trees mature within 15 to 17 years to compare with 30 years in Japan. I believe that Japan still imports a lot of pines to make tissue papers. It is even called "Napia" as they all go from Port of Napier.

One of our members Kathleen kindly brought so many boxes of fabrics and embroidery kit sets from the lady who died. Her name was Leanne Potton. We have enough fat quarters in our stock, and I decided to sell them to members. We raised \$450.00 with Kathleen and Judith's help. We had to give away a lot of embroidery kit sets as nobody was interested in buying them. So thank you Kathleen and everyone who bought fabric.

One of members wanted to present a quilt to a sick man. We don't have many male quilts in our stock however we just managed to find one. Perhaps we need to make more male oriented quilts.

I believe that you've read the annual report & financial statement prepared by Shelly. We have to give to our local communities to keep our non-profitable status as you know.

We gave 176 quilts and \$1952.93 last financial year. And we have to keep the record of time we spent. Our Ailsa has been collecting records for the last 3 months now.

It was 484 hours in May! Thank you to everyone who were involved with these hours you spent last month. Your kindness makes me proud to be involved.

The following are the two most important pieces of information for her.

- 1. The member's guild number
- 2. The total hours worked on quilts

Ailsa needs some indication of which part of the guilt making process the member worked on.

There is no need for you to itemise exactly which of the different portions of your time is spent on each part of the whole quilt making process.

Ailsa is happy with you emailing her (imbrough@ihug.co.nz) with your volunteer quilting time and make sure that you give her your membership number. When you hand in the quilt(s) advise the community quilts helpers that you've emailed her so the info doesn't get written down twice.

Our next recipient of quilts will be "Gift" by request of Carole Kenealy. This is outreach is under the Catholic Diocese of Auckland - it has residential beds for people with intellectual disability. On alternative Saturdays they run a study group and companionship group for people with disabilities preparing them for sacrament reception, faith of all sorts for all ranges of age groups and abilities.

We have a list of organizations that our members want to give quilts to as follows:

- 1. Youth Horizon
- 2. Home & Family Counselling Service, Women's Refuge in Manurewa
- 3. Open Home Foundation.

I have emailed them and will wait for them to reply to me.

And lastly our thanks goes to Ellen Butland for making so many finished quilts every month.

June's Speaker - Caroline Mason

CAROLINE MASON - a quilter from Matamata. Caroline was the lady who organised sending 741 quilts to Vanuatu (we contributed from community quilts if you remember) after cyclone Pam. Caroline has now started an organisation called *Threads Across the Pacific* – this offers unemployed women of Vanuatu electric sewing machines, sewing supplies and introductory sewing workshops. The Project provides the opportunity – it is up to the individual women whether they use the machines to sew for themselves and their families or whether they choose to produce products to sell, either within their community or to tourists and expats.

The secondary purpose is to identify any NiVan woman (from introductory workshop) who has the sewing skills, organisational skills and motivation to progress to offer opportunity and mentoring as tutors. Caroline and her tutor team take new donated sewing machines and sewing supplies to girls and women in Vanuatu on regular workshop trips. Caroline says her current stocks of cotton fabric and threads are low and she would love to receive these items, especially larger pieces of cotton fabric (and lace, zips, patterns etc).

Every woman and school girl receives a basic sewing kit, so if any members would like to contribute towards sewing kits that would be greatly appreciated.

A sewing kit comprises: a drawstring bag containing pins, a pin cushion, a black thread and white thread, hand sewing needles, a tape measure, a notebook and pencil, a small bag of buttons and a pair of fabric cutting scissors.

It would be lovely if our Guild members could each make a sewing kit up for Caroline to take with her after the June Meeting.

Pop up thread catcher

Supplies: Fat quarter of fabric, cardboard, scrap of batting, 1/2" rigilene or plastic strapping/or cut circle from pringle box, matching thread, 2 \(\frac{1}{2} \)" diameter cardboard circle, general sewing supplies

Cardboard - cut 2 x 2 %" circles

Fabric - one rectangle 8" x 9.3/4" trace two circles onto fabric then cut out 1" bigger all around

Batting - cut one piece exactly same as cardboard circle

Rigilene - cut one strip 11 1/2" long

Sew a running stitch '' around edge of circles. Place batting, then cardboard in centre of fabric, pull up stitching to gather around, secure with a knot. Make the other circle the same but can leave out batting. Sew two circle sets together, wrong sides.

Press ¼" over on LONG edges of rectangle. Fold in half and place mark on half way and 5/8" down on one side of 8" (SHORT) side. This is for gap to thread rigilene through in casing. Sew from half way to outer edge, then from 5/8" mark to edge. Stitch a casing 5/8" from folded edge around fabric tube, making sure lower edges are even. Thread rigilene through gap in casing and double ends over to fit. Sew gap closed.

Turn inside out and mark quarters on tube and cardboard base. Match pins and stitch base to top making sure you catch both seams.

Turn right side out - twist top and push together.

Bigger Thread Catcher 4 1/2" high x 4" dia. Cut Rectangle Fabric 11" x 14" Circle 2 x 4" Rigilene 15 1/2"

Auckland Festival of Quilts 2017

Hi everyone.

I popped along to the Dorothy Collard exhibition evening, which was a real treat. Malcolm Angus was the judge this year and he took everyone for a walk through all of the entries. Malcom was a charming host for the evening and spent a few minutes chatting about each quilt and how he saw its strengths and then he gently suggested where the quilter could improve her skills or design. Malcom was looking for a wow factor – either a bit of risk taking, or humour or fun that would set the quilt apart. He found it all in Val William's entry – congratulations Val for your superb workmanship and daring design of two old people who had had their time, and now only moved gracefully in their memories. The quilts will also be on display at the Festival of Quilts in November.

The idea that a quilt is going to be judged can really deter someone from entering their quilts in the Festival of Quilts. At the last meeting, I was delighted to speak to someone who was going to put a quilt into the Show for the first time this year, but didn't want it judged. That's fine, and we have an Exhibition Only category for quilts that will be displayed but not judged. Just tick that box on the entry form. But let me chat about judging for a minute. Competitions and judging are all tools to improve our quilting skills and abilities – so that we can quilt better. A judge will indicate where you can improve your workmanship – and that may be something you already know, or provide the impetus to go and find out how to get better. But there are times when we don't always want to quilt better – we just want to quilt. In which case, the judge's opinion is not that important. It is up to you as to how much importance you give the judges' opinions.

Meet the Winners – a new idea...

Diane Campbell, one of the FOQ committee members had a lovely time at the Melbourne Quilt Expo and especially liked the meet the owner of the quilt session. If you are a winner at the Festival of Quilts this year, we would like you to take a seat by your quilt for a Meet the Quilter session. We have timed them in the afternoon, before prizegiving and quilt pickup. So keep Saturday and/or Sunday free from 2-4 pm. This is all about talking quilts and reaching out to people who may want to start quilting, or even join the friendly guild.

Hand in day is 30 September!

The guild meeting for October this year is actually on 30 September 2017. This will be Hand In day for the FOQ. Please bring your completed quilts with their entry forms and quilt name badge showing current membership.

If your quilt is at Symposium on this date, please register beforehand with me (by email) your interest in entering your quilt in FOQ.

For the last two years I have been Merchant Coordinator, and would like to give up the post to fully concentrate on being the Convener. Quilt Entries:

- One entry form must be completed per item
- Quilt dimensions must be accurately recorded in centimetres
- Consent to use images of the quilt for publicity purposes is at the discretion of the quiltmaker preference to be recorded on entry form
- Design sources or patterns must be acknowledged
- For quilts entered in the 'one maker' category, the entire work must be completed by a sole maker this includes all aspects of the work, including piecing, quilting and binding
- Quilts should be entered into the 'Exhibition Only' section if they are not to be judged
- Junior Members must enter their work into the 'Junior' section

Number of Entries:

- A maximum of 6 quilts can be entered by any one quilter, with a maximum of 3 in any category.
- One of the 6 entries may be an oversized quilt. If more than 12 oversized quilts are entered overall, the AFQ Committee reserves the right to run a ballot to determine which quilts will be hung (we are limited to 12 large frames)
- The AFQ Committee reserves the right to move quilts to a different category and/or reduce the number of quilts allowed per quilter, depending on entries received overall

Labels:

- A label must be attached to the back of each quilt, on the bottom left corner when the quilt is viewed from the back, OR if the work is not a quilt, the label may be sewn or pinned in an appropriate position
- The label must contain the following details:
 - o quilt title
 - o maker's name
 - o contact number
 - o AQGI membership number
 - o category entered
 - o design source
 - o dimensions in cm (width x length)

Velcro:

- Velcro must be securely SEWN along the top of the quilt back or onto the top of a hanging sleeve attached to the top of the quilt back - the velcro must NOT be pinned or glued
- Challenge and mixed media quilts must have the HOOK velcro these works are displayed on the solid grey stands
- All other quilts must have the FLUFFY Velcro these works are hung on standard quilt frames
- Quilts that don't comply with the above rules will not be accepted

Definitions:

A Professional quilter is one who:

- has previously been awarded more than one blue ribbon (1st prize) or Best of Show in any judged quilt shows, national or international – number of blue ribbons is accumulative
- teaches or publishes in the field of quilting
- sells, designs, quilts or participates in making quilts for financial gain

Quilt Sizes and Categories for Entry

Quilt Sizes are defined as:

Quilt Size	Width	Length
Wall	0 to 150cm	0 to 150cm
Small	0 to 185cm	0 to 250cm
Large	185cm to 250cm	0 to 250cm

An **Oversized** quilt is larger than a large quilt but NOT exceeding 290 cm in any direction. Only 12 oversized quilts can be accepted over the whole exhibition, regardless of category. **Quilts larger than 290 cm** in any direction will not be accepted.

A maximum of **SIX** quilts may be entered by any one quilter, with a maximum of **THREE** in any one category. Only **ONE** of the six entries may be oversized.
